 - (i) i. "we" refers to the father and his son.
 - ii. Metaphor: "seed" refers to the son.
 - iii. The father seems to be repenting his way of upbringing the son which might have gradually led to the present scenario. The father wondered whether it was he himself who was responsible for the failure of their relationship.

 - ii. The poet has compared rain with a song because he finds similarity in both.
